The Story	
Iona School	My name is Finlay MacInnes, and I am Millie Tindal. We represent the past, present and future of Iona. Our people have populated this land for thousands of years. The oldest building recorded is preserved in

concrete under our new nursery at the school, dated 5,000 BC.

Reader 1	We are where many have been before us. Centuries separate this gathering from those who came from Ireland and established the first monastic settlement on this site under the leadership of Columba. This may have been a place of worship for longer still.
Iona School	Columba arrived in 563AD to a busy, bustling community – our island already a place of pilgrimage and tourism for the local population.
Reader 1	The Columban monks lived in modest, primitive buildings. They made of this island a centre for mission which married convictions about God with commitments to care for the world and its people.
Iona School	In 795, we had our next visitors – the Vikings. They didn't visit often, however it is recorded 83 monks were slaughtered. St Oran's chapel was built in 1180 and this Abbey was founded in 1200.
Reader 2	Over the centuries, this sanctuary was enlarged and the Abbey - the living and work quarters for the monks - was built in typical form around open cloisters.
	Between the tenth and fifteenth centuries, the buildings were regularly ransacked. But what was razed to the ground was always raised up again by the Benedictines, until the time of the Calvinist reformation in the mid 16th century.
	In the centuries following the reformation, the ruins attracted famous people including Mendelssohn and Johnson, neither of whom would have foreseen that one day, these buildings would stand again in their pre-reformation glory.
Iona School	Our school opened its doors in 1774. In 1846 we were hit by the potato famine and rents were raised by 50%. 100 people left our island for America, 52 for Canada and 31 for Australia. In 1847, the royal cruise comes to Iona. Prince Albert landed but Queen Victoria stayed on the boat. In 1881 the last New Year's Day Shinty match was played on the Machair.
Reader 3	At the end of the 19th century, the then Duke of Argyll, who owned the island, decided that this place of worship should be rebuilt.
	He put the church and the abbey ruins into the hands of a trust with the wish that they would never belong to one denomination but be used for Christian worship by any tradition.

lona School	In 1909 Archie MacArthur and Janet MacNiven celebrated the first wedding in
	the restored Abbey Church.

Reader 3 In 1938, George MacLeod started the Iona Community. He had known of the ruins of Iona Abbey since childhood and felt summoned by God to reconstruct the monastic building on the north side of the church

> With a team of trainee ministers and unemployed tradesmen, MacLeod initiated a process of restoration. Over twenty-five summers, people came from all over the world to work voluntarily on the project, which was financed in the main by donations.

MacLeod determined to make this a place of meeting, conference and renewal, open to people of all faiths and none.

Iona School In 1956, we had a visit from the Queen, the Duke of Edinburgh and Princess Margaret. In 1961 the last working horse was put out to graze.

Reader 4 The Iona Community was founded to develop patterns of belief and living which emphasised commitment to prayer, politics, reconciliation and renewal.

> Magnificent as the rebuilt Abbey was in 1963, it was built according to the standards of the time, with shared living accommodation, sometimes in small cramped rooms, no access for people with limited mobility, little by way of heating and sanitation,

and certainly no en suite or mezzanines.

It became clear a decade ago that major renovation was required, and, with the consent of Historic Environment Scotland, plans were made and fund raising began.

The major areas of refurbishment were identified as accessible accommodation and sustainable energy use, including insulation, an efficient heating system, a lift, reduced water consumption, sensor-activated lighting and energy-saving light bulbs throughout the building.

In 2016 the Iona Abbey Capital Appeal was launched. Her Royal Highness, the Princess Royal, graciously agreed to be patron.

Iona School In 2020 we survived a global pandemic and Iona fell silent.

Reader 4 The refurbishment was finally completed in August of 2020 and the living spaces opened to residential guests just over a week ago.

Iona School In 2021 The Iona Community brought the accommodation of the Abbey into the 21st Century and the Princess Royal is visiting the island today.

	We have long lasting connections to this island. Our ancestors lie with the ancient kings of Scotland. We are proud members of the community of Iona. And you are all most welcome to our home.
