

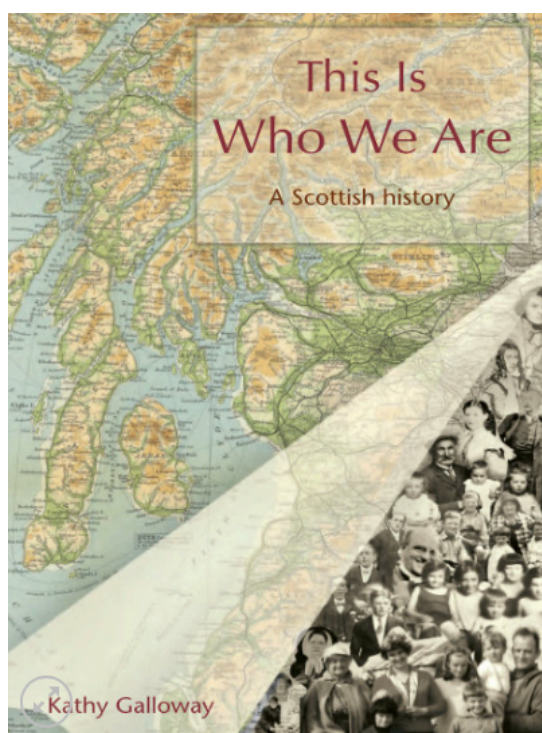


Kathy Galloway was nominated to appear on the Glasgow Women's Library, 'Women on the Wall' by her friends, to celebrate her work and life for her 70th birthday.

Her name will appear on the wall of the remarkable Glasgow Women's Library building, and the following description of Kathy will appear on a dedicated section of the GWL website:

"Kathy is a feminist, activist, writer and theologian who has persistently championed the rights of women through local community projects and global engagement. She has always challenged the patriarchy both within and outwith the church. Her life has been dedicated to social justice including gender equality, poverty, LGBT+ rights, environmental justice and cross-religious and cross-cultural understanding. In 1981, she was the first Co-ordinator of the Edinburgh Peace and Justice Centre (now Peace and Justice Scotland). In 2002 she became the first female Leader of the Iona Community. In 2005 she was one of 1000 women worldwide who were collectively nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. She has three children, two grandchildren and one adopted Vietnamese grandchild, and has lived and gardened in Glasgow for many years. She was nominated to be on the wall by friends to celebrate her 70th birthday."
